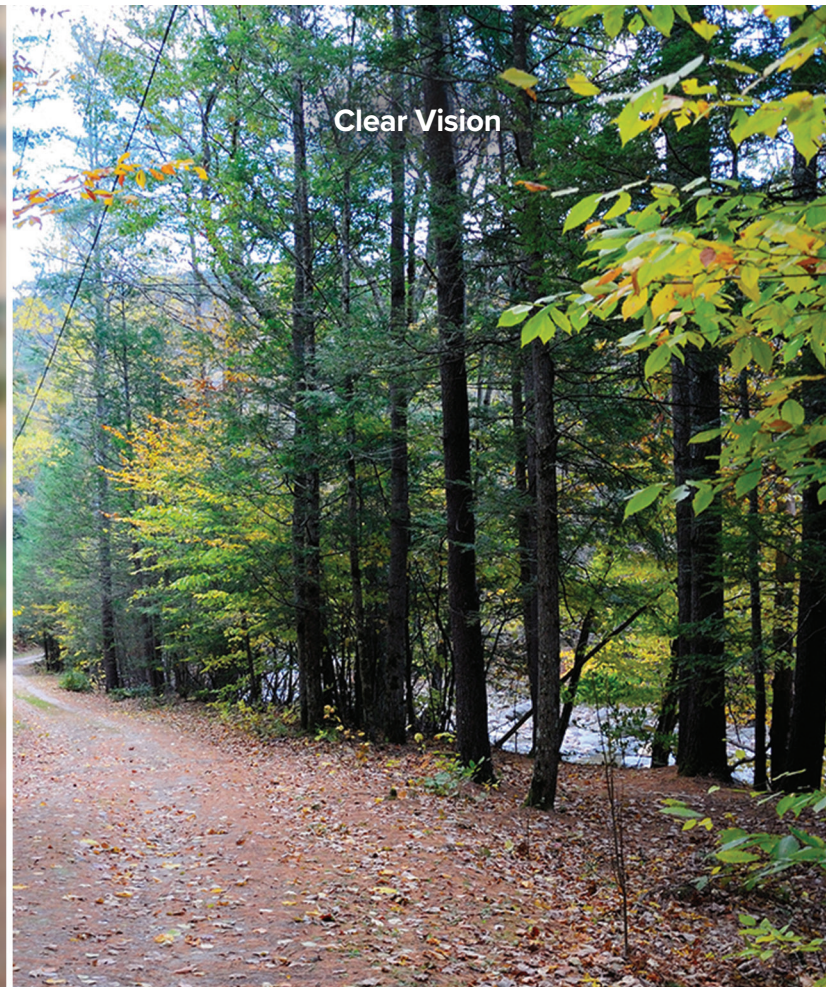

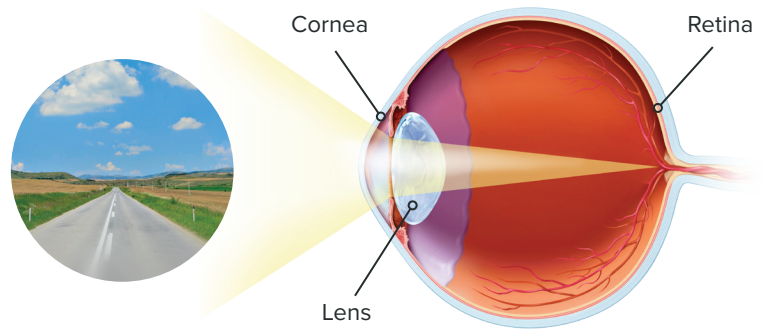

Understanding Cataracts

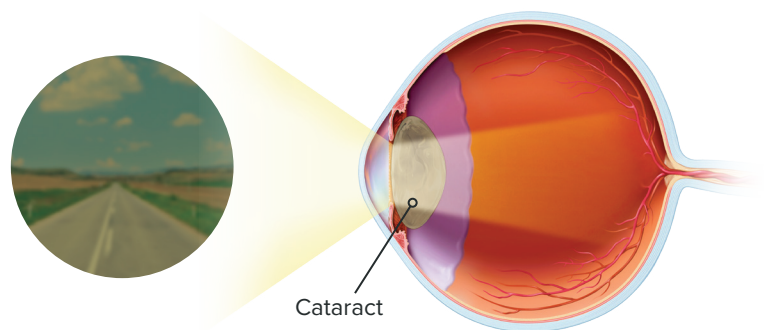
Cataracts usually occur as part of the natural aging process of the eye. While many people think that cataracts are a “film” over the eye, cataracts are actually caused by a gradual clouding of the clear, natural lens inside of the eye. As the clouding progresses over time, your vision becomes less sharp. Cataracts develop slowly and painlessly over time. In early stages, symptoms may be so mild that you may not even realize your vision is changing. However, as cataracts become more dense, you will experience one or more of the following symptoms:

- Blurry or cloudy vision
- Eyeglasses prescriptions that change often, or no longer work
- Colors appear dull and washed out
- Difficulty reading in low light
- Poor night vision
- Halos or glare around lights

What Causes Cataracts?

If we all live long enough, everyone will eventually develop cataracts as part of the natural aging process. However, some conditions can cause cataracts to develop earlier or more quickly such as glaucoma, diabetes, or an autoimmune disorder, consistent exposure to UV rays, eye injuries or surgeries, and smoking.

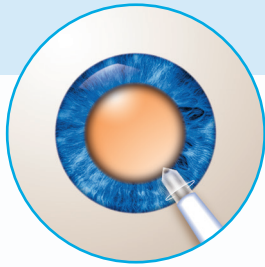

STEP-BY-STEP

Cataract surgery is typically a quick, outpatient procedure. With modern cataract surgery, there are no shots, no stitches, and no patches. You may be given mild medication to relax you, gentle drops will completely numb your eye, and you'll be awake and comfortable.

Step One



Through a micro-incision, Dr. Alfred will break up and gently remove the cloudy, cataract-affected lens.

Step Two



A new flexible lens implant is gently inserted into the eye, to replace your natural cloudy lens.

Step Three



With the cataract removed, and the new lens in place, light can once again travel clearly to the back of your eye.

WHAT TO EXPECT AFTER SURGERY

For many patients, the clarity and color of their vision right after surgery is amazing and surprising. The day after your procedure, your eye is likely to feel somewhat itchy and sensitive to light. This typically subsides within a day or two. There are no patches or significant downtime.

Your initial vision will continue to improve during these first days as you get used to seeing things through your new lens. We will see you to check on your healing and to make sure that you're on the road to your best visual outcomes. After about a month, recovery should be complete and you will be back to fully living the life you love!

Let's Talk About Reading Vision

Loss of near vision, or presbyopia, is another natural condition of aging. As we mature, we progressively lose the flexibility needed to focus on near objects and gradually develop the need for reading glasses or bifocals to see things clearly up close.

What About Astigmatism?

Astigmatism is a condition that affects about 36% of the US population. Astigmatism occurs when the cornea is oval, or shaped like a football, creating multiple points of focus on the retina. This condition causes blurry or double vision that can be difficult to correct with basic contact lenses and glasses.

2. ASTIGMATISM CORRECTION

A Toric IOL is designed to correct moderate to high amounts of astigmatism to provide clear, crisp distance vision, even at night. With the most advanced Toric IOLs we are now also able to improve your near vision as well as reduce your dependence on glasses for most activities!

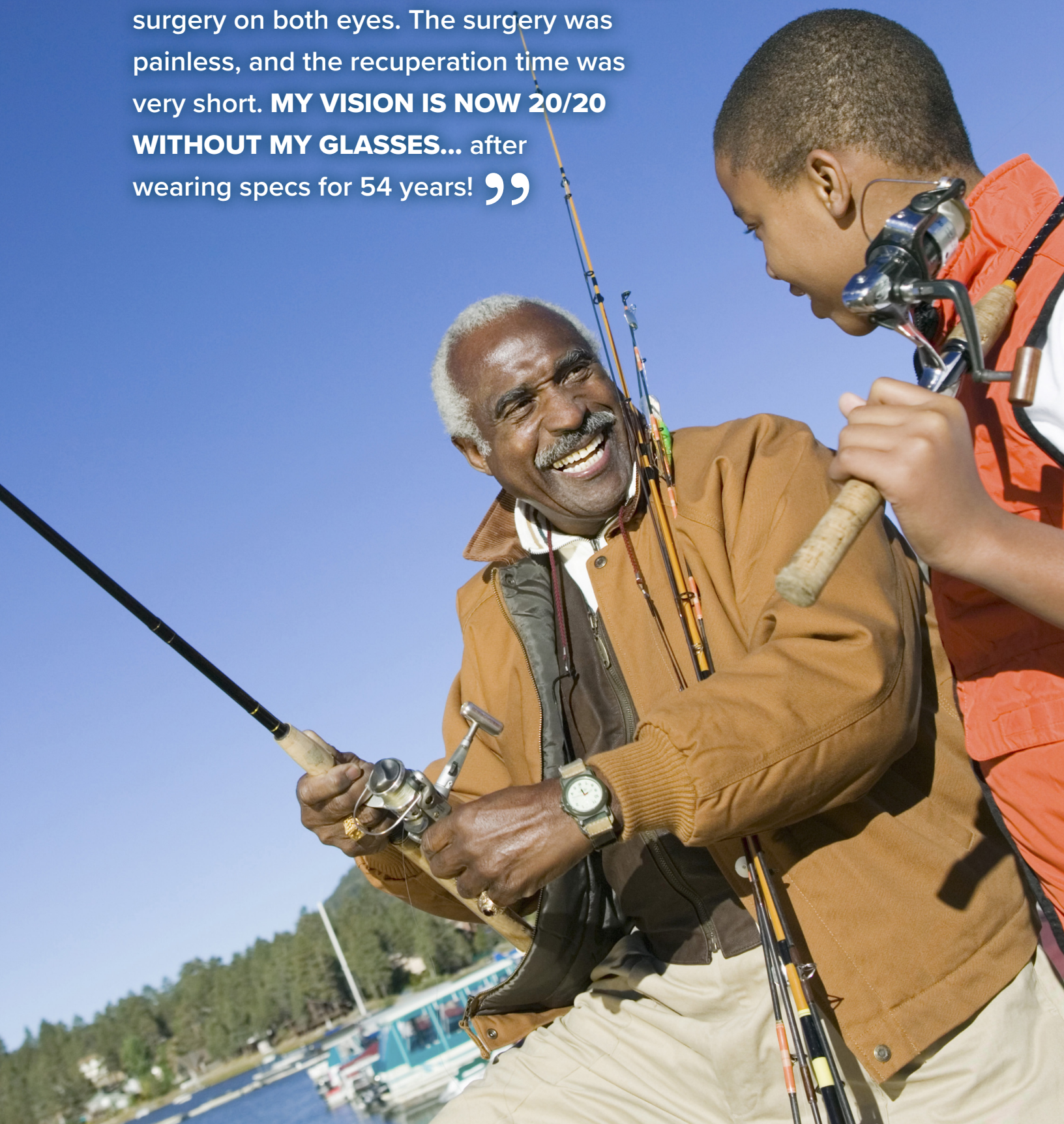

Questions and ANSWERS

When is it time for cataract surgery?

It's never too early to talk to your doctor about cataract surgery. During your thorough eye examination, Dr. Alfred will discuss the condition of your cataracts, a timeline for surgery, and your personalized options in detail. The term "ripe" no longer applies to cataracts. The time for surgery is when cataracts are causing a decrease in your vision that is affecting your ability to perform daily activities.

How do I know which lens is right for me?

While the characteristics of your eyes certainly play a critical role in lens selection, it's just as important to consider your lifestyle, and the role vision plays in the activities you enjoy. During your exam, Dr. Alfred will take the time to discuss your options and help you select the lens that will change the way you see the world!

Will I need to have cataract surgery again?

The lens replacement is permanent, offering you a lifetime of good vision. However, some patients will experience what's known as a "secondary cataract" which we can assure you is not an actual cataract. Over time a clouding of the tissue surrounding the lens may occur. Should this happen, a quick, in-office laser treatment is used to painlessly remove the cloudiness and restore clear vision.

UNDERSTANDING YOUR BENEFITS

Medicare and most insurance plans consider cataract surgery with a standard, monofocal lens medically necessary and will cover the expense. Deductibles, co-insurance and copays will apply. If you choose to improve your life and vision with a Lifestyle Lens, additional fees apply. Considering the freedom and visual benefits that come with these options for the rest of your life, many patients feel the additional cost is a worthwhile investment for their lifestyle.
